

**NEW STUDENT MAJOR ADVISING SUMMARY FOR 2018-2019 TRANSFER STUDENTS**

Students are admitted to UCSC with a "proposed major" in most cases, and later petition to officially declare the major. Admission to UCSC does not guarantee acceptance into a particular major. Junior transfer students must be officially declared in a major by the deadline in their second quarter of enrollment.

**Major: GLOBAL ECONOMICS**

<p>Qualification requirements and/or prerequisites for the major:</p>	<p>Transfer students who listed global economics as their intended major and who were admitted, have already been screened for qualification to the major. Students who hope to pursue this major and did not list it on their application should contact the adviser ASAP.</p>
<p>Transfer students who intend to pursue this major should do the following prior to the beginning of their first term...</p>	<p>Students who have taken college-level transferable classes that may apply to the requirements of this major should submit an unofficial transcript to the department prior to July 1. This transcript is in addition to the official transcript that is required by the UCSC Admissions Office.</p>
<p>It is recommended to take these courses their first term:</p>	<p>ECON 100A: <i>Intermediate Microeconomics</i> (if math prerequisites are complete), and Language Course (if available at your level).</p>
<p>If unable to enroll in courses listed above:</p>	<p>Contact the major adviser at 831-459-5028 or 831-459-2028.</p>
<p>Skills important for success in this major:</p>	<p>Critical reading and thinking skills, skills in mathematics and formal reasoning, deductive thinking.</p>
<p>Although not required for the major, students in this major might benefit from these courses/ subjects:</p>	<p>We recommend taking ECON 10A and ECON 10B (accounting), if students have not already taken the equivalent courses elsewhere. We also recommend any course outside of our discipline either for specific interest, or to just experiment.</p>
<p>Other information:</p>	<p>ECON 100A/M, 100B/N and 113 are much more difficult than ECON 1 &amp; 2. Students should devise their academic plans to ensure they will not have to take more than one of ECON 100A/M, 100B/N, and 113 in the same term, since it is crucial that students pass these courses on the first attempt.</p>
